



FROM THE DESK OF THE SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

COMMENCEMENT

Several years ago, I observed with interest a group of alert first graders in the Southern Boulevard School. It was my first year in Chatham Township and I was impressed by the little people who came to greet me. Time passed and just as you, the members of that first grade class, grew intellectually and physically, so did your school system grow. Many changes occurred in our schools to promote the finest education a community can afford for its boys and girls. A new school, the Lafayette Avenue School, was built and I was able to great you there on your arrival from the Southern Boulevard School, I found that by the time your class arrived at the Lafayette Avenue School, your number had grown from the small group that had met me September, 1952, to four classes of 125 students. Four new rooms were added to the Lafayette Avenue School to accomodate the growing school population. The science area had been increased and the finest scientific

equipment was made available for your benefit. In order to fulfill your needs, we established a language class in German. This was an experimental class, however your interest brought about having language as another subject for classes following you. Many of you expressed particular interest in specialized mathematics and found that Algebra Club assisted you in further comprehension of that advanced subject.

Through the years we have watched you grow and have taken pride in your accomplishments. You have succeeded in educational growth and development. Now, I'd like to tell you something about the new role you are about to undertake. Graduation means commencement. Commencement means the beginning of learning new courses of study at a different level of education. YOU, The Graduating Class of 1959, will now undertake new learning activities. It is your responsibility to measure up to the wealth of knowledge you have acquired and to prove your abilities by being responsive to your new medium of education.

The Staff and I are going to observe your progress with interest for we know that you will uphold the fine educational traditions we have established in Chatham Township Schools. The Staff and I join in saluting you and wishing you well in your academic endeavors as you move forward to - COMMENCEMENT.



Looking ahead to the future, we see that we will have new experiences as we so on to higher education. We will make new friends, do new things and go to


many new places.
